

Cervical Cancer Awareness and Screening Practices among South and South-East Asian Migrant women in Sydney Project



Calling South and South-East migrant women aged 25-74 years old!

Cervical cancer is the 14th most common cancer among women in Australia (Cancer Australia, 2019). Survival of cervical cancer is greatly increased with early detection, via the Cervical Screening Test. However, little is known about the cervical cancer screening practices of migrant women, in particular Chinese and Indian/Bangladeshi migrant women, in Australia.

This project aims to explore the cervical cancer knowledge and awareness amongst migrant women living in Sydney. It will also investigate the cervical cancer screening practices amongst these women.

If you are a Chinese, Indian or Bangladeshi woman, between the ages of 25 and 74 years old, and was born overseas, and have lived in Australia for over one year, you are encouraged to participate in the study. In this study, you will complete a questionnaire about your knowledge, attitudes, and screening practices of cervical cancer. All information will assist our understanding of cervical screening practices, to raise awareness and education of the disease and its detection, and further promote early detection.
